

A Memorial,

From the President and Members of the  
Board of Trustees of the Second Presbyterian  
Church of Cranberry

To the President and Members  
of the Board of Trustees of the first Presbyterian  
Church of Cranberry Greeting -

Dear Brethren,

Whereas, the various causes  
which have conspired, in bringing about the pres-  
ent state of things, with regard to the public  
worship of Almighty God, in this place; are of  
so recent occurrence, as to preclude the necessity  
of advertizing to all of them on this occasion.  
One or two may suffice -

And whereas, the first Church was not  
sufficiently large, to accommodate all the adults  
belonging to said congregation, there being about  
as many seats below, as there were Members in  
full communion. Consequently excluding the  
living Generation, the hope of the Church, from  
the privileges their Parents were enjoying in the  
House of God, on the Sabbath day -

And let it be remembered, that those in favor  
of more room at first, had not the most distant  
idea, of making it any where, but in, or about  
the first Church, thereby being desirous, of promo-  
ting union and the best interests of the Church  
at large; nor yet in after time, whilst it had  
been attempted, could there have <sup>been</sup> a subsequent  
period, agreed upon, ~~from~~ the commencement  
of such operations - But the guidance of  
a mysterious Providence hath otherwise directed.  
While having but recently enjoyed in common

with yourselves that Inheritance, which we all as Members of one Church called our own, and which our Ancestors deserve for the benefit of their posterity, (among whom we claim to be recognized) to enable them to sustain the Church of Christ in this place. That although worshiping under a separate roof, from causes before referred to, our relationship is still unchanged; We are engaged in the same Glorious Cause, supporting the same Doctrines, Worshiping the same God. None of your bone, flesh, or "your flesh," And some would humbly claim a higher, and holier kindred, viz. theirs of the same immortal Glory, with your selves.

We therefore cannot perceive, that we have forfeited any right, claim, or title, which we have at any time possessed, to our proper and proportionate share of the funds, or property, of the first Church, either Real, or Personal, now in your possession, and of which, we have so long enjoyed the advantages in common with yourselves.

With an ardent desire to maintain that Christian spirit, which I should ever characterize the intercourse between those who profess to be followers of Christ, and having full confidence, that, we will be met by you in the same spirit, and relying upon the Justice of our Claim; we most respectfully, though earnestly, request that you will make a division of the Property of the Church, and assign, and set over to us, our proper share of said inheritance, both real and personal; and although, we hereby disclaim the idea of dictating to you on that point, yet as the party soliciting, it may be expected that we should

State the proportion, to which we think ourselves intitled, and with which we would be satisfied. We do therefore in the same friendly spirit, which we have intended, should characterize this Memorial, and with a desire to ask nothing more than is just, and equitable, propose, that you assign and set over to us, one half of the Funds of the Church, and that portion of the Parsonage lying South of the Cemetery Neck Road.

We therefore cannot perceive that we have forfeited any right claim, or title, which we have at any time possessed to our proper, and proportionate share of the funds, or property, of the first Church either real, or personal now in your possession, and of which we have so long enjoyed the advantages in common with your selves. With an ardent desire to maintain that Christian spirit, which should ever characterize the intercourse between those who profess to be followers of Christ and having full confidence that we will be met by you in the same spirit, and relying upon the justice of our claim, we most respectfully though earnestly request that you will make a division of the property of the Church. And assign and set over to us, our proper share of the Christianity both real and personal, and although we hereby disclaim the idea of dictation to you on that point, yet as the party soliciting, it may be expected that we should state the proportion, to which we think ourselves entitled, and with which we would

be satisfied. We do therefore in the same friendly spirit, which we have intended, send this memorial with a desire to ask nothing more than is just, and equitable; I propose that you design and set over to us one half of the funds of the Church and that portion of the Parsonage, or the estate lying south of the Cranberry Neck Road.

N.B. It is hoped that the above Memorial will be read before the Congregation specially convened.

*To the Honorable the Legislative Council and  
General Assembly of the state of New Jersey.*

The Trustees of the first Presbyterian church and congregation of Cranbury, would respectfully invite the attention of your honorable body to a subject regarding the interests and property of the congregation, of which they are the legally constituted guardians.

About six years ago, the necessity and propriety of building a new house of worship began to be agitated, and as is generally the case, in matters of this kind at the first, there was a great diversity of opinion. The majority of the congregation were opposed to immediate action, and were for postponing the consideration of the subject to some future period, owing to the great want of unanimity. This however did not satisfy the minority, and after several meetings of the congregation, failing to secure a majority in favour of the project, they withdrew, and resolved upon the erection of a second church. When this was decided upon, several of those who had acted with the minority, feeling that there was too much rashness and precipitancy in taking such a step, determined to act with them no longer, because they believed it much better to wait a little, when they had every reason to suppose the object would be accomplished with considerable unanimity and without dividing the congregation. But those of the minority who withdrew—went forward—erected their building, and were incorporated as the second church and congregation of Cranbury. They then applied to the Trustees of the first church for a share of the property. This application was respectfully answered in the negative, and the Trustees declined granting their request for two plain reasons :

One, that the property in question belonged to the FIRST church, and was deeded to the Trustees in behalf of that church, and could not therefore be given to another and a distinct incorporated body, which would be alienating it from its original design.

The OTHER, that the applicants might receive the benefits of said property, by remaining in connexion with the church and congregation to which it of right belonged, and that by withdrawing of *their own accord*, they thereby relinquished all right to the same, and all claim to any part of it.

This decision and answer did not satisfy the Trustees of the second church, and they then requested that their application should be submitted to the whole congregation. In accordance with their wishes, a meeting of the congregation was called for this purpose, when there was a large attendance of all the pew holders and supporters. The request of the second church was laid before them, and the question was put, whether they would accede to it, or not. This question received a decided negative vote, only one dissenting.

It was then hoped that the matter would there rest; but it appears from a late publication in one of the weekly papers of New Brunswick, that the Trustees of the second church are about to make application to your honorable body for the passage of a law granting them what THEY suppose their share of the property of the first church. Now, we as the acting *guardians* of the rights and property of the *first* church and congregation, object to this course on the part of the Trustees of the second church to obtain their ends, for the following reasons, which we hope your honorable body will duly consider.

1st. It is a most novel proceeding in cases where rights and property are concerned, especially where the *right of property is contested*, and where exact justice should be administered, to pass by the *civil courts*, and refer such cases at once for decision to your honorable body : to leave the *judicial tribunals* constituted for the administration of the law, and for obtaining the ends of justice, and to seek redress at the hands of the *legislative department*. How can it be expected that questions of grave import can be calmly weighed and settled according to law, without a proper understanding of all the circumstances,—without testimony, and in one word, without all those steps of precaution which are the concomitants of the *bench*, the *bar*, and the *jury*? If the Trustees of the second church are disposed to resort to the proper tribunal for a decision of this matter, we will not object, but will be ready to meet them there, where we do not fear that we will fail to substantiate the *exclusive right* of the first church to their property.

2d. Should your honorable body take definite action on the memorial of the Trustees of the second church, and issue said memorial according to their requests, it would establish a precedent that would endanger the peace and prosperity of all the churches in this state possessed of any funds: and would throw open the door to applications of the same kind at every meeting of the legislature ; making your hon-

orable body, much of the time you are in session a *judicial tribunal* for the division of the property of churches, upon the application of minorities who choose to withdraw: establish this precedent, and any number of disaffected individuals in a congregation could come forward, and claiming their share of the property retire. It could be divided and subdivided until each neighborhood in a congregation would be induced to claim their respective portion, under the plea of building a church for themselves. In this way the funds of many churches would soon be frittered away. And then what would become of the security of these trusts, when legacies sacredly bequeathed to particular churches, could be so easily diverted from the design of the donor, and appropriated to others. It is quite evident, that such a precedent, would jeopardize all church property in the state, and throw an uncertainty and confusion over all such sacred trusts. We cannot but hope, therefore, that your honorable body will not sanction a principle, and establish a precedent, the operation of which will be so extensively injurious.

Be it known to the Committee appointed by the congregation  
of the First Presbyterian Church of Cranberry  
in connection with the building committee  
to ascertain the cost of the building and painting


